

History Corner – Sandwich Post Office

In the 19th Century, post office buildings were powerful symbols of the Dominion Government and played a vital role in the community and operations of a district town. The Sandwich post office operated first from William Hands's home through a sentry box, and later at John Spiers' general store. Designed by David Ewart (chief architect of the Federal Department of Public Works), this 1905 building plan was executed many times across Canada. Aside from the first-floor post office, the second floor served as offices for Inland Revenue and Customs, while the third was the Postmaster's home. The bricks on the building reportedly came from Jules Robinet's brickyard and the Victorian fountain in a

replica of one donated in 1909 by former resident William Leech. The post office was closed in 2013 and was remodeled as a café in 2016.
