1. Call to Order

## **6.** Special Education Presentation

B. Rota presented our Breaking Barriers: Adapted Physical Education grant. In 2023-2024 GECDSB was awarded a \$40,000 Breaking Barriers grant for adapted baseball in partnership with the Toronto Blue Jays Jays Care Affiliate School Program. Four leadership classes received one day training from the Jays Care Affiliate Program and were responsible for two days of our All-Star Game activities. Every STEPS and GAINS Classroom had the opportunity to join a Leadership class for a day at the Miracle League Fields in Riverside or Amherstburg. The day was paid in full through the grant. The program teaches athletes living with disabilities the core life skills inherent to baseball, including teamwork, communication, determination, resiliency, inclusion, support and courage. Javs Care provided athletes with t-shirts, hats and adaptive equipment so they could represent their teams. Communication aids were sent to each school with 50 premade pictures. Each teacher also received a Jays Care Affiliate School flag to hang in their school. For the 2024-2025 school year we received close to \$75,000 to expand the program. GECDSB will pilot the Leadership Affiliate Program for the Toronto Blue Jays Jays Care, the leadership students will provide feedback for a possible launch across Canada next year. All high school leadership classes where a STEPS program exists have signed on.

We also have a new partnership with the University of Windsor, Human Kinetics program. APEX Program mission is to enhance the lives of adults with developmental disabilities through full inclusion in physical activity and sport. On November 15<sup>th</sup> STEPS teachers and Physical Education teachers will participate in a professional development morning at the University to learn about physical activity and sport for individuals with developmental disabilities by providing adapted physical exercise programming with the goal of enhancing overall health and quality of life. We are working with the University to develop manuals and videos to support physical education classes, along with the possibility of an in-school training with select schools to pilot a 6-week program with Leadership and STEPS students. We hope to see you in May and June at our second annual All-Star Game.

#### 7. Special Education Updates

Restructuring Supports for Students in the RISE Program, presented by C. Mills.
 On November 5<sup>th</sup>, 2024, the Trustees approved the Multi-Year Financial Recovery Plan (MYFRP). What this means for Special Education areas; a reduction in

Psychologists/Speech and Language Pathologists/Communicative Disorders Assistants. A change in delivery model for speech and language to support a mixed model of consultation and direct service. The service delivery model for psychological assessments would be examined to support a centralized list of students waiting for assessments and psychological consultations. A centralized list will help ensure that all students have equal access to the necessary assessments.

Restructure supports for students in RISE – the board will leverage this opportunity to examine class sizes, academic consistency, equitable access, and a more inclusive learning environment for its students.

Our process moving forward will involve engagement will all relevant stakeholders. Consultation has to occur before the final plan is presented.

We are seeking advice from SEAC in the following areas. What questions you have for each consideration? What are other items we may need to consider?

Professional Development Updates

L. Bates presented the Professional Learning for November 15<sup>th</sup>, 2024. Elementary Educators and ESS staff engaged in Math Learning, Ministry Math Priorities and Knowing the Math Learner. Elementary RISE and ESL Educators took part in JUMP Math, Ministry Priorities and System Learning, Knowing the Math Learner. ECE's engaged in learning with their teaching partners within their home school. GAINS SSWs will be attending a GAINS learning session with their GAINS team at Tecumseh Vista. ESS in elementary will engage in Math learning with their school teams. GAINS Teams had a choice of multiple sessions to engage in learning to support GAINS classroom programming and planning in a supportive learning

environment. Sessions will be led by community partners, as well as members of the GECDSB Special Education Team. Secondary Educators took part in subject specific areas. Secondary STEPS, MAPS and LSTs focus on providing varied learning experiences. A number of PSSP team members will be leading PD sessions for staff across the system. Members of the Psychology team will engage in additional learning experiences including the Dorothy Hill Memorial Symposium.

T. McCarthy suggested for future professional development a parent/student forum.

C. Mills shared the feedback from our Special Education Survey. The format is a little different this year, it was well received by the committee.
